Editorial

"During these meetings, I realised that anyone using farmers' seeds, on whatever scale, could find a global echo for their convictions". Pierre A., meeting participant

Against a backdrop of widespread climate change and the dramatic erosion of cultivated biodiversity, farmers' seeds play a crucial role in preserving agricultural ecosystems and ensuring people's food sovereignty. Numerous testimonies during the meetings helped us to fully understand the extent of this role. These seeds, passed down from generation to generation, embody an inestimable cultural and biological wealth. They are the fruit of the know-how of farmers the world over, who have adapted them to local needs, climatic conditions and the specific agronomic challenges of their territories. However, they face many threats, including agricultural standardisation, the massive loss of know-how, patents on living organisms, GMOs and restrictive regulations. **The International Farmers' Seeds Meeting was organised with the aim of bringing together farmers, groups, researchers, NGOs, decision-makers politicians and committed citizens.** As part of a collaborative approach, the event provided an

opportunity to strengthen the exchange of knowledge, raise public awareness and promote concrete solutions for a more resilient and ecological agricultural future.

The general aim was to share the knowledge and know-how associated with farmers' seeds, while highlighting their central role in adapting to the climatic and geopolitical challenges of our time.

We were thus able to :

- Promoting exchanges and networking between farmers and collectives from all over the world in order to share experiences and strengthen solidarity.
- To raise awareness among the general public of the issues surrounding cultivated biodiversity, and in particular its role in global food security.
- To help consolidate the place of farmers' seeds at the heart of the urgent agro-ecological transition.

"What I take away from these meetings is the urgent need to strengthen and develop cultures of cooperation between us, throughout the world, and to systematically reposition the seed (...) in food issues. In short, the energy of these meetings makes us all want to be, despite our frailties, much more curious and much more ambitious. If there's one slogan I'd pick out, it's: "Onions make us strong".

STEERING COMMITTEE



Founded in 2003, the Réseau Semences Paysannes (Farmers' Seed Network) coordinates a movement of collectives dedicated to the exchange of knowledge, expertise and seeds between practitioners. These collectives work in fields and gardens, using agricultural practices adapted to farmers' seeds. The Network supports autonomy and cultivated biodiversity as a fertile common good, in opposition to the appropriation and patenting of living organisms. It provides information on regulations and promotes the dissemination and circulation of free and reproducible seeds, right down to our plates.

SOL is an agricultural and citizens' association which, for over 40 years, has been working to support farmers, highlight the role of farmers in society and provide them with SOLutions for a fairer world. We work in France and internationally to promote agriculture that respects both the land and people.




The MSPM is a collective of farmers, gardeners, citizens, elected officials, chefs and researchers who have been campaigning since 2018 for the development of farm seeds in the Alpes-Maritimes bioregion. More than 50 producers on both sides of the French-Italian border organise the recovery, multiplication and distribution of around 100 local varieties. From training in seed production to the creation of a sustainable supply chain, the MSPM is committed to a local and sovereign food model woven into a network of regional, national and international resistance.

The European Coordination Let's Liberate Diversity! (ECLLD) is an international organisation dedicated to the dynamic management of plant genetic resources for food and agriculture. Its core belief is that the diversification of our food systems can be achieved through the collaborative efforts of the various actors involved in cultivated biodiversity. The Coordination consists of a strong network of 21 members with a network of 170 national organisations operating in 20 European countries with a membership base exceeding 35,000.




Other numbers...

- **On farms:** 82 people hosted for between 3 and 5 days on 13 French and Italian farms.
- **Between peers:** in Antibes (Alpes Maritimes, Espace du Fort Carré) - over 400 participants.
 - 2 days, 18 technical workshops, 1 plenary session around 4 major conferences
- **General public:** in Antibes (Alpes Maritimes, Campus Vert) - over 800 participants 1 day, 1 association forum, 26 stands, 8 workshops and conferences, 6 artistic performances (show, choir, dance workshop, plant parade, etc.), 4 exhibitions, 2 film screenings and 3 concerts.
- **16 volunteer interpreters** in French, English, Spanish, Italian, Hindi and Arabic, coordinated by a specialist association

General review

Building technical and political content

A **steering committee** was set up to oversee the organisation, made up of the 4 organising associations represented by: Maxime Schmitt, co-president of the MSPM, Aïcha Bourad, economic issues and European coordination coordinator at the RSP, Clotilde Bato, general delegate of SOL, Matthias Lorimer and Gabriele Maneo, coordinators of Let's Liberate Diversity!

Caroline Formont (3 months) and Alice Champseix (9 months) were recruited to coordinate the event, and the steering committee also benefited from the support of Marie Schmitt for administrative and logistical matters.

- **A Programming working group was** set up, made up of resource persons linked to the networks of the four organising associations, including researchers, activists, farmers and seed producers (Confédération paysanne, INRAE, Manufacture paysanne, Agrobio Périgord, CCFD-Terre solidaire, members, supporters and employees of the Réseau Semences Paysannes, SOL, MSPM and LLD, etc.).
- **A wide range of conferences and workshops:** Inspired by the methodology used to organise the CRID Summer University, a call for proposals was issued for the workshops on the Thursday and Friday peer-to-peer days. In order to ensure that everyone was represented, it was asked, as far as possible, to propose workshops/sessions led by three organisations, including at least two from different countries. The choice was made to give priority to proposals for sessions led by several collectives, involving a diversity of countries of origin of the collectives and/or speakers, in order to enrich the viewpoints on the different themes addressed. The call for proposals was shared by CCFD-Terre solidaire and SOL with part of its network of partners in the South.



- 25 proposals were studied by stakeholders, mainly from Europe but also from Africa (Niger, South Africa);
- 18 proposals were selected, dealing with farmers' seed issues on :
 - Selection (2 workshops),
 - Production (1 workshop),
 - Storage (1 workshop),
 - Machinery (1 workshop)
 - Collective organisation (participative guarantee systems, 1 workshop)

and the challenges of :

- regulation and patenting (3 workshops),
- collective organisation and networks (1 workshop),
- seeds and migration (3 workshops),
- gender and seeds (1 workshop),
- the microbial life of seeds (1 workshop),
- evolving populations (2 workshops),
- farmers' organisations and research bodies/gene banks (1 workshop).

The content of these workshops is summarised and detailed in a "diary" report of the meetings. Conferences on topics that are accessible and relevant to raising public awareness of farmers' seeds have been selected:

- conference on new GMOs,
- conference on farmers' cereals and food resilience,
- conference on the Andean approach to agroecology,
- conference on the link between identities/migrations and seeds,
- workshop to raise awareness of seed migration,
- A workshop for the general public on vegetable seed production.



A common theme for a plenary session: migration and seeds

During the 2019 General Assembly of the Réseau Semences Paysannes (hosted by Graine des Montagnes in the Hautes-Alpes, France) at a time when many farmers' collectives were deeply engaged with the issue of farmers' seeds, a border patrol in support of migrants was organized. This experience prompted participants to (re)consider the connections between travel, exile, migration, and farmers' seeds across time and space.

The diversity of food we know today depends on human movements and the circulation of plants over generations on a planetary scale. The history of agriculture is a history of migrations, and its development still depends to a large extent on these flows. Exchanging seeds and know-how between farmers within a region, a country or between continents enables farmers to adapt more effectively to the consequences of climate change, to increase the diversity of plants grown in a region and to preserve cultivated biodiversity.

A festive and artistic event

A [call for participation](#) was launched for this associative forum and 32 responses were received from associations from different countries to present their work, their seeds and their activities to the general public.


The event was an opportunity to mobilise artists and groups, including Radio Tout Terrain (a radio station in the Roya valley), the Italian theatre group Nouvelle Plague, which put on a show about farmers' seeds, the Roya choir group, the artist Aurore Emaille, who made a film about seeds, and others.

A team of 6 women made 7 costumes from plants and organised a plant-based fashion show.



Making it easier for everyone to sign up and take part

- An [automated registration system](#) was set up and launched, with a range of prices to make the event more accessible to all (standard price 180 euros, gift price 300 euros, reduced price 90 euros). Registration for workshops was also [automated and launched in September](#).
- A [dedicated application for participants](#) was launched at the beginning of September to bring together all the information about the event.
- The programme was also available online and on paper for the general public day. All registration and programme information was available **in at least French and English, but the registration link was also available in Spanish and Italian.**

Aid in kind :

Funding for international partners: in a number of associations have also invested time and funding to bring in their partners, including CCFD-Terre solidaire, Buzuruna Juzuruna, Slowfood in conjunction with the Terra Madre international festival, the MC Knight Foundation, Longo Maï, Going to Seed, the Rosa Luxembourg Foundation and Terre et humanisme.

Materials and equipment: we benefited from the free loan of the Fort carré by the town of Antibes; the provision and installation of large marquees by the town of Château neuf de Grasse; donations of organic produce from the Biocoops maralpines; and materials and supplies from the Raja company via the Raja Danièle Marcovici Foundation.

European/American networks

This edition of the Rencontres Internationales has been merged with the General Assembly and the forum of the European network Let's Liberate Diversity!, of which the Réseau Semences Paysannes is a member.

The merger of these two events meant that European, American and Chinese associations belonging to the LLD network were able to take part in the event.

Partners from the South

The construction of the international part of the Meetings was the fruit of collaboration between SOL and the other associations mentioned in the "budget" section. This collaboration enabled participants from sub-Saharan Africa, the Maghreb/Middle East, Peru, Senegal, India, Togo, Palestine, Iraq and Iran to attend.

The partners were selected for their pre-existing partnership links with the organising structures and their knowledge of seed-related work. Attention was paid to gender balance: out of 86 international partners, 40 were women. A great deal of work went into obtaining visas for the partners: of the 89 international partners planned, 66 were actually able to take part in the Meetings (12 visas were refused, 8 were cancelled due to the war in Lebanon and Palestine, 1 for personal reasons and 2 for health reasons).

Other international partners have also signed up from South Africa, Benin, Colombia, Senegal and elsewhere. As well as an 8-strong delegation from Oceania.

● Reception at the farms

Priority was given to international participants, but the farm visits were open to all, subject to availability. 82 people took part in these farm visits.

The farms were mobilised within the pre-existing networks of the Maison des Semences Paysannes Maralpines in the Alpes-Maritimes and in Italy and the Réseau Semences Paysannes :

The international partners and other registrants were allocated to the farms according to their choice of sectors. Partners who did not speak French or English were grouped together with partners who could translate the exchanges simultaneously.

Offering sustainable food during the event

- A self-built kitchen in the Espaces du Fort Carré
- Made with local products
- As much as possible from products derived from farm-saved seeds

The products were bought from producers in the Alpes-Maritimes and the equipment was collected from the MSPM network and Emmaüs.
